The game is played on a table tennis table. Side panels and sliding fielders are placed around the table to create an arena, a small ball and ramp are used to bowl, and a wooden bat enables players to score runs, simulating a game of cricket.


Since taking over as head of year, I have been really impressed with the way Y8s have taken the many and varied opportunities on offer to them.

ENTERPRISE WORKSHOP



30 of the year group have been involved in Young Enterprise workshops since November. These sessions give young people the life skills, knowledge & confidence they need to succeed in the changing world of work. This is a great

opportunity for our students who are really enjoying these sessions and finding them very benefical.

As Y9 students approach the halfway mark of their first year of GCSE study, they are preparing for exams as well as focussing on their future careers.

The Y9 exams take place week beginning 4th March, and teachers have been helping students develop their revision skills in lessons and tutor times.

Tutors have also introduced the Kudos careers website to help students think about what their GCSEs might lead to.

REVISION PLANNERS

Students have been encouraged to start revising early, with revision planners covering the month leading up to the exams. Tutors asked students to list the subjects they have to revise for, making note of other commitments like after-school sports and clubs. They decided when and how they would revise, transferring topic lists into a custom-made timetable and setting personal revision goals. Revision times vary as there will be no exams in subjects like Childcare, Health and Social Care

and Hair and Beauty. However, in general, students have found they need to plan for around two hours of revision a night if they want to cover all of their topics without using up their half-term holiday.





FOCUS ON SCIENCE - TASSOMAI

Lots of Y9 students have signed up to Tassomai to help prepare them for their GCSEs. This allows students to revise "little and often" to build up their knowledge and understanding of Physics, Chemistry and Biology through a series of multiple-choice quizzes.

Students can log in via the internet or download an app to their phone or iPad. They can get going straight away with a Quick Start Quiz, or search the topics they are studying to revise a particular unit. Tassomai lets their science teachers know how they are doing and will ask targeted questions to help improve their progress.

Students are set a daily goal which is targeted to their capability. Completing quizzes and getting answers right gives you XP points, and hitting daily targets means extra bonuses.

CAREERS

Students have free access to Kudos, an online careers guidance website. They can answer a range of questions about their skills and interests, building up a picture of



possible future careers. Kudos makes recommendations based on the answers given and allows you to search for careers by industry or salary range. You can highlight specific jobs and make personal plans including arranging work experience, joining a society or club and building your CV.

THE IT GIRLS

Y8 girls who have entered a national cyber security competition received expert advice from information technology giants IBM.

Twelve Y8 students are competing in a national competition called Cyber First to find the female cyber security experts of tomorrow. And to help them prepare for the tough challenge the girls were lucky to receive insight into the industry from two senior cyber security staff from IBM, Mark Bowers and Saritha Arunkumar.

The two experts explained the challenges that could face the students in the competition and gave them insight into cyber security as well as staying safe online.

Headteacher, Nigel Pressnell said, "We are incredibly grateful to Mark and Saritha for giving up their time and giving our students a valuable insight into the world of cyber security."

"Cyber security is a very fast growing industry and it's essential that all students, including female students, see the opportunities that are available to them. Competitions like this are a great way of encouraging young people into a world of work they might not have considered before."

The girls have been divided into three teams and have already completed the first round of the competition. This included challenges in cyber security, logic and coding, networking and cryptography.

Each question posed to the students was derived from skills used every day by cyber security professionals and all can be answered using techniques freely available on the internet.

Now the girls have to wait to hear if they have finished in the top ten of teams and the chance to compete in a face-to-face grand final in March.

The eventual winners will receive £1,000 for school computer equipment and individual prizes.

ARNEWOOD ROCKS

Despite his teacher's advice, Galileo refuses to conform like the rest of his classmates. Galileo is imprisoned and meets a soul mate in 'goth' Scaramouche. Meanwhile, Planet Mall leader Killer Queen is out to destroy rebels called the Bohemians who believe in a prophecy that musical instruments will again return. Galileo and Scaramouch join up with the Bohemians in a quest to rock the planet once again.
