

# GRADUATION ASSEMBLIES 2023

The penultimate week before the end of term saw each year group attending a graduation assembly to celebrate their achievements and capabilities over the past year. Each assembly hosted a guest speaker, our newly appointed



Head Students, Headteacher, Mr Anderson and the Chair of Governors, Mrs Elizabeth Cook.

Students were awarded certificates for Ambition (for determination and

endeavour), Citizenship (for contribution to the school or wider community), Half Colours (for nominations in approximately half their subject areas) and Full Colours (for nominations in nearly all their subject areas). # Infrared electron spectrometer **TWILIGHT SESSION**

group of chemistry students from Year 12 had the opportunity to visit the Southampton University Chemistry Department for a twilight session on the 7th of July. They were able to have hands on experience with an Infrared electron spectrometer, an incredible piece of equipment that is usually only available in high level industry or universities. The experience could prove valuable as they will be tested on the equipment in their year 13 exams. The students used the Infrared electron spectrometer to extract trimyristin from nutmeg. They then also used an NMR machine and thin layer chromatography to test for and identify their product and test its melting point.



School were delighted to have PC Richards, PC Hills and PC Gallimore visit us in early July and share how students can keep themselves safe in the community. The focus was 'Knife Crime Awareness' The session allowed students to engage with officers, ask questions and seek reassurance that support is available for anyone who has a concern about themselves, family and friends or even someone they may not know.

# STUDENT COUNCIL

The Student Council has recently started discussing ways in which we can improve our school environment, not only in providing new facilities for the school, but also in developing our school's organisation system which could enhance the future experience for pupils at Arnewood.

Firstly, The Student Council has heard and taken into account the student voice in regards to new facilities which could be added to the school. Together with the PSA we have discussed the addition of more picnic benches in outside areas, which would allow students to have a larger seating area for both lunch and break time, and also a covered eating area outside with would also allow students to have more options on where to eat and would make the back of the school less cramped as everyone would be able to have different places to spend the unstructured moments of the day. We have also looked into ways in which we could add more bins to reduce littering and increase the number of water fountains around the school. We agreed that the addition of goalposts in the field would be a valuable addition.

Secondly, The Student Council has also discussed with Mr Anderson the possibility of launching a house system in the school during the next academic year, which would be a way in which we can create a stronger and more connected community within the school. The Student Council considered the possibility of having either three of six houses, in which there would be either one of two tutor groups from each year group. The Student Council also suggested that house events and competitions could be hosted, creating a community within the school walls. Houses could be identified by different coloured badges and each pupil's number of ADDS points could be added up to a 'House Total'.

### How does participating in final qualifying for the Open Championship relate to your goals?

It definitely has been a goal of mine as I wish to compete at the highest level once I qualify from my degree. So that is a positive step in proving that I'm good enough to compete at that level.

### Are there any particular challenges have you faced and what are you doing to overcome them?

Tiredness with my full time job and then playing tournaments on my days off is always a tough one to balance. So trying to sleep when I can always helps!

#### What are your major highlights and achievements within your golfing career?

I have won 14 professional tournaments in 80 events which is a good record for the moment.

#### Why did you decide to pursue a career in sports?

I have always loved every sport so i couldn't imagine myself doing a 9-5 desk job.

### Is there a coach or professional that you look up to as a role model and why?

My coach Matt Belsham who teaches many DP world tour, PGA tour and LPGA players. He's been a big inspiration as well as Rory McIlroy and Justin Rose.
